

QUALITY GOOD The Washington State Apple Crop is experiencing strong growth and good supply, with an estimated 2023 crop of 134 million boxes, compared to 110 million this past season. The size profile benefits the foodservice industry, with a peak of 100/113ct and more 125s than 88ct. All varieties, from Red Delicious to Cosmic, have seen substantial gains, resulting in better value and availability throughout the season. Summer 2024 won't bring Granny Smith's prices to Washington like they did recently. The growing conditions have been ideal, and no weather issues have been reported.

QUALITY FAIR Asparagus production is limited in all growing regions, with most production in Mexico in southern Baja. Northern Baja is closing due to seasonality, while the Sonora Desert is opening fields in higher elevations. Peru is at 50% of normal volume due to El Niño, and volume will not increase until the north opens fields in 2-3 weeks. Markets are active with less asparagus available.

Mexico is the primary source of avocados in the US, with over 99% of its volume coming from the country. Last week, Mexico shipped around 60 million pounds of avocados to the US market, a 10% increase from the previous week. The current US inventory is around 52 million pounds. Harvests in Mexico are strong, with hopes for improvement in size curves. Small fruit (60s and smaller) made up about 50% of the pack out, but moving into higher elevations and harvesting new acreage is providing more volume in 48s and a bit of an increase in 40s and larger. The USDA has not reported on 32/36s due to light volume. Dry matter is 26%-28%, with eating and ripening quality improving each week. Q4 is a great time to promote Mexican avocados, especially small fruit and bagged small fruit.

The market will remain elevated. Hurricanes impacted the growing regions of Georgia and Mexico, resulting in crop losses. Georgia recently experiences a freeze and have lost majority if not all of the crops. Beans are transitioning to Florida. Guatemalan beans are starting to arrive in the market.

**Snow Peas:** Supplies are improving with fair to good quality in the west. Supplies are scarce in the east due to protests in Guatemala, but the situation is expected to improve next week, with roads opening and more containers expected to arrive.

Sizing has improved, with some 9s being harvested, but a higher percentage of 12s is common for this time of year. Flexibility of sizing may still be required during loading.

California and other regions are also facing weather-related challenges, with jumbos and cellos in low supply. Prorates may be expected, and table carrots may be a good substitute. Tropical storm Hilary disrupted plantings in Imperial Valley & Riverside County, California, and Kern County, California, causing a week delay in planting and reduced yields. Hurricane Idalia's devastation in Georgia has significantly affected carrot farms, potentially impacting January volume.

QUALITY FAIR Limes: Cost continues to be elevated, especially on large fruit. There's a significant price spread across the size spectrum; the lime market is expected to stay escalated. The new bloom has caused a significant pricing gap across the sizing spectrum, with potential record-breaking numbers compared to historical trends in Q4. Extreme heat and humidity have also affected quality and shelf life, leading to low availability. Peak sizing currently consists of small fruit, 230s and 250s, accounting for 70% of total harvested yields. Consider expanding your specification to accommodate crop trends and ensure supply.

Lemons: Fruit has started in District 3 (Desert region), with loading in Yuma and Mecca. Supplies are limited and will remain tight until early November. District 1 (Central Valley) will begin operations in mid-November. Because of Mexico's limited availability and 75% choice yield, prices will remain high.

**Oranges:** Navels are expected to begin the second week of November if the fruit meets the required Acid to Brix ratios. Production of packable fruit is slightly down by 5% from last season, with more Choice than Fancy. The late Navel crop is expected to be light industry wide.

# **Produce Category Overview**

The annual transition from Salinas to Yuma is expected to happen in the coming week, which will have an impact on all Green Leaf, Iceberg Lettuce, Romaine Lettuce, Romaine Hearts, Processed Salads, and Baby Tender Leaf items such as Spring Mix, Baby Arugula, and Baby Spinach. Once transition start, expect to see several challenges this month.

Asparagus are limited in all growing regions but expected to improve in 2-3 weeks. Blackberries are escalated with tight supplies due to the weather. Blueberries (FORCE MAJEURE) prices are escalated with limited supplies expected to last through late December. Carrots are short on jumbo and cello due to weather. Chili Peppers remain tight due to the weather. Green Beans supplies continue to be limited but expected to improved by the second week of November and will be in good shape for the holiday. Limes market is escalated, particularly on large fruit. Mushrooms are beginning to get tight leading into the holiday.

# FPAA, NatureSweet urge preservation of 2019 Tomato Suspension Agreement

Distributors of Mexican tomatoes are pushing hard to blunt the effort by domestic producers to terminate the 2019 Suspension Agreement between Mexican tomato producers and the U.S. Commerce Department.

The agreement establishes a reference price for Mexican tomatoes.

In September, Michael Schadler, executive vice president of the Florida Tomato Exchange, said there is strong support in the U.S. agricultural community for terminating the Tomato Suspension Agreement and imposing antidumping duties on Mexican tomatoes.

He said over 100 American tomato growers from 13 states have called on the Commerce Department to terminate the Suspension Agreement. This includes tomato growers from Alabama, Arkansas, California, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Termination of the Tomato Suspension Agreement, and the imposition of antidumping duties, will not put any restrictions on the volume of Mexican tomatoes permitted to enter the U.S., Schadler said then.

"Rather, it will only ensure that Mexican tomatoes are sold at fair prices, in accordance with U.S. and international law, as well as the USMCA," he said in September.

In public comments filed recently, the Fresh Produce Association of the Americas, a group of U.S. distributors of Mexican fresh produce, said the Florida Tomato Exchange provides "no plausible explanation" or factual support for why an antidumping order will do a better job than the 2019 Suspension Agreement to address any alleged problems.

"FTE's comments are more notable for what they did not address than for the rehash of its weak and unsupported attempt to justify its termination request," the FPAA said in its filing.

Abandoning the reference price under the 2019 Suspension Agreement and imposing antidumping duties will deprive the U.S. tomato market of vine-ripe tomato varieties that the domestic industry does not produce and will destabilize the U.S. tomato market because of increased volatility in pricing....
