QUALITY GOOD According to a January report from USApple, apple holdings are down 4.1% from previous time period. Total volume of bushes reported on January 1 was 84.2 Mil, which is 12.5% less than the January 5-year average. Report showed Washington continue to produce the most, with 91.9 Mil bushels (42 lbs) during 2022–23 follow by Michigan with 9.9 Mil bushels. Washington production has dropped by 7.3 Mil bushels year-on-year. Gala had the largest production at 21.1 Mil bushels, followed by Red Delicious with 15.8 Mil and Fuji at 12.8 Mil. Per the USDA's projection, follow by back to back years of volume decreased, the U.S. is projected to increase production by 158,000 tons to 4.5 Mil in 2022-23. Despite higher supplies, exports are expected to fall 53,000 to 670,000 tons, marking the third consecutive year of decline on reduced Washington output. With higher shipments from New Zealand, imports are anticipated to increase by 10,000 to 115,000 tons.

Mexico accounts for 78% of avocados in the US market, while California is at 21% and Peru is less than 1%. With a healthy inventory on the trees in the higher elevations that harvesting crews have moved into, the recent significant harvest volumes from Mexico have brought the current season into line with years previous. Dry matter is currently between 33% and 35%, which gives the fruit a peak flavor profile and less time to ripen. It is critical to maintain a cold chain and store at 38°F for the longest possible shelf life. Higher altitudes will also provide an abundance of avocados in grade 2 and larger sizes. Previously, the start of the Flora Loca/Summer crops was determined by date, within the first week of July, but this season the Summer Crops in Michoacan and Jalisco can be harvested once the fruit meets a dry matter of 23%, so the harvest of Loca could begin as early as the first week of June, depending on the dry matter. Summer crops, which are harvested at lower elevations, typically have a size curve dominated by 60s and smaller, while the harvest of late season fruit at higher elevations will produce large sizes and grade 2 fruit. Peruvian imports are projected to increase through June before peaking in volume in July. Columbian avocados will enter the market the 2nd week of June through September. Avocado volume and pricing should remain promotional throughout the summer.

Extreme alert on **Grapes** due to the offshore season ending early and Mexico has been delay in starting due to weather. Extreme alert for **Celery** with light supplies for May. **Iceberg, Green Leaf, and Red Leaf** are experiencing smaller head and lighter weight due to the cold weather at time of harvesting.

# The Link Between Highly Processed Foods and Brain Health

Eating packaged foods like cereal and frozen meals has been associated with anxiety, depression and cognitive decline. Scientists are still piecing together why.

Roughly 60 percent of the calories in the average American diet come from highly processed foods. We've known for decades that eating such packaged products — like some breakfast cereals, snack bars, frozen meals and virtually all packaged sweets, among many other things — is linked to unwelcome health outcomes, like an increased risk of diabetes, obesity and even cancer. But more recent studies point to another major downside to these often delicious, always convenient foods: They appear to have a significant impact on our minds, too.

Research from the past ten or so years has shown that the more ultraprocessed foods a person eats, the higher the chances that they feel depressed and anxious. A few studies have suggested a link between eating UPFs and increased risk of cognitive decline.

What's so insidious about these foods, and how can you avoid the mental fallout? Scientists are still working on answers, but here's what we know so far.

### What qualifies as an ultraprocessed food?

In 2009, Brazilian researchers put food on a four-part scale, from unprocessed and minimally processed (like fruits, vegetables, rice and flour) to processed (oils, butter, sugar, dairy products, some canned foods, and smoked meats and fish) and ultraprocessed. "Ultraprocessed foods include ingredients that are rarely used in homemade recipes — such as high-fructose corn syrup, hydrogenated oils, protein isolates and chemical additives" like colors, artificial flavors, sweeteners, emulsifiers and preservatives, said Eurídice Martínez Steele, a researcher in food processing at University of Sao Paulo, Brazil. This classification system is now used widely by nutrition researchers.

UPFs make up a majority of the packaged foods you find in the frozen food aisles at grocery stores and on the menu at fast-food restaurants — 70 percent of the packaged foods sold in the United States are considered ultraprocessed. They're increasingly edging out healthier foods in people's diets and are widely consumed across socioeconomic groups.

"Ultraprocessed foods are carefully formulated to be so palatable and satisfying that they're almost addictive," said Dr. Eric M. Hecht, an epidemiologist at the Schmidt College of Medicine at Florida Atlantic University. "The problem is that in order to make the products taste better and better, manufacturers make them less and less like real food."

### What effect do ultraprocessed foods have on mental health?

Recent research has demonstrated a link between highly processed foods and low mood. In one 2022 study of over 10,000 adults in the United States, the more UPFs participants ate, the more likely they were to report mild depression or feelings of anxiety. "There was a significant...
