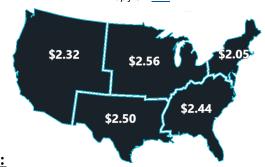

According to a January report from USApple, apple holdings are down 4.1% from previous time period. Total volume of bushes reported on January 1 was 84.2 Mil, which is 12.5% less than the January 5-year average. Report showed Washington continue to produce the most, with 91.9 Mil bushels (42 lbs) during 2022–23 follow by Michigan with 9.9 Mil bushels. Washington production has dropped by 7.3 Mil bushels year-on-year. Gala had the largest production at 21.1 Mil bushels, followed by Red Delicious with 15.8 Mil and Fuji at 12.8 Mil. Per the USDA's projection, follow by back to back years of volume decreased, the U.S. is projected to increase production by 158,000 tons to 4.5 Mil in 2022-23. Despite higher supplies, exports are expected to fall 53,000 to 670,000 tons, marking the third consecutive year of decline on reduced Washington output. With higher shipments from New Zealand, imports are anticipated to increase by 10,000 to 115,000 tons.

Mexico accounts for 78% of avocados in the US market, while California is at 21% and Peru is less than 1%. With a healthy inventory on the trees in the higher elevations that harvesting crews have moved into, the recent significant harvest volumes from Mexico have brought the current season into line with years previous. Dry matter is currently between 33% and 35%, which gives the fruit a peak flavor profile and less time to ripen. It is critical to maintain a cold chain and store at 38°F for the longest possible shelf life. Higher altitudes will also provide an abundance of avocados in grade 2 and larger sizes. Previously, the start of the Flora Loca/Summer crops was determined by date, within the first week of July, but this season the Summer Crops in Michoacan and Jalisco can be harvested once the fruit meets a dry matter of 23%, so the harvest of Loca could begin as early as the first week of June, depending on the dry matter. Summer crops, which are harvested at lower elevations, typically have a size curve dominated by 60s and smaller, while the harvest of late season fruit at higher elevations will produce large sizes and grade 2 fruit. Peruvian imports are projected to increase through June before peaking in volume in July. Columbian avocados will enter the market the 2nd week of June through September. Avocado volume and pricing should remain promotional throughout the summer.

Recent rain events have promoted fruit growth and coloring but may lead to conditional defects in the form of stylerend breakdown and oil spots that can appear days after initial transport. This is more frequent in large sizes. The crop is peaking on small and mid-sized fruit. Crossings are expected to be elevated throughout the month of May. Small fruit has just about bottomed out in price. Total market stability is expected in the coming weeks.

Lemons: Weather has been holding up. Shippers will try to stretch current supplies to end of June. Some very late ranches in D1, but this year will end a little early. Fruit is sizing up. Rain has hurt pack-outs for many growers. Peaking on 115s. 140s Fancy are tight as this is the size/grades preferred by national retailers. Argentina will start in June.

**Oranges:** Navels are projecting to end mid-June. Brix is nice with an excellent color. Size is still small and will continue until the end of the Navel season. Peaking on 88s with very limited 48s/56s.

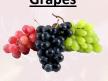

Extreme alert on **Grapes** due to the offshore season ending early and Mexico has been delay in starting due to weather. Extreme alert for **Celery** with light supplies for May.

# Demand softens as the summer heat begins

An unusually early-season heat wave in the Pacific Northwest is shattering records. The weather throughout the region is forecasted to run in the 90s, 20 degrees above average for this time of year.

To put the rarity of this weather event in perspective, in 70 years, temperatures have only reached these heights a handful of times and never this early in May.

On the opposite corner of the country, Florida Governor Ron DeSantis signed into law this past week a bill that requires private employers to use the federal E-Verify system to confirm workers' immigration status. This is alarming news for fresh produce growers and shippers in an exceedingly tight labor market.

The unspoken reality is that under-documented workers are the backbone of much of Florida's agriculture supply chain (along with other labor-intensive industries: landscaping, construction, and hospitality). Florida has an estimated 455,000 employees not authorized to work in this country. With an unemployment rate of only 2.6 percent, tightening the labor supply will cause wage inflation.

This change in Florida policy will undoubtedly negatively affect prices for already struggling consumers and thrust unauthorized workers further into the dark economy. As a result, many are planning moves to states that haven't adopted a show-me-your-papers strategy.

Overall produce prices are running below average. Down another -5 percent, prices are contradicting historical norms for week #19

Green beans find their ceiling. Even on low supply, prices are down -4 percent over the previous week. Florida is nearly finished, and Mexican supply is following a similar trajectory.

Georgia growers are still a week out but should provide some relief to Eastern markets within the next 7-10 days.

A delayed start to California's Spring brussels season is pushing prices to a shocking \$41. These are the second-highest prices seen in the last ten years. Oxnard, Santa-Maria, and Salinas-Watsonville growers are an estimated three weeks behind schedule.

As a result, buyers are looking to weather-weary Mexican growers to cover the gaps. Due to inclement weather, week #19 brussel volume from Mexico is on the lower end of the historical spectrum. Some quality issues, such as seeders, have been reported, leading to reduced yields and smaller sizing.

As grape import supply grinds to a halt, average prices catapult another +15 percent over the previous week to a mindnumbing \$37. The transition to Mexico is an estimated up to three weeks behind the usual start date.

With that in mind, markets are in uncharted territory, with the worst supply woes...
