SUPPLY

The Washington State Apple Crop is in the final 3 to 4 months left of shipping. The 2022/23 crop will finish slightly more than 100 Mil boxes, which is much less than the 122 Mil boxes finished in 2022. Due to a shortage of availability, weekly shipments have been much lower than usual. Top 5 Apples for Foodservice: Red Delicious, for instance, has 1.5 Mil fewer boxes than it did at the same time last year. Peak sizes are 113s and 125s, with 88s and larger still maintaining higher prices. Quality is good. Gold Delicious has 220,000 fewer boxes than last year. Quality at the end of the year has been excellent. Granny Smith has 2.6 Mil fewer boxes than at this time last year. They have been scarce this season, and costs have been higher than usual. Quality has been good all year, and as the state enters the summer months, the quality will continues to get better. Gala is the only variety with 1.1 Mil more than this time last year. Making it to the New Crop Galas this year will not be a problem. Fujis is roughly the same as this time last year. Quality has been good. New Crop Washington State apples will be delay 1-2 weeks later than previous season due to the late bloom caused by the cold weather in spring. The new crop estimate has not been sent out to the industry, but rumor has it in the 122 Mil range.

Peru production is steady with fair quality. California is finishing up. Michigan and Canada continue to have good supplies with excellent quality. Washington State is wrapping up due to seasonality. Baja continues to improved. Market is trending down as volume continue to increase from all growing regions.

Avocados



SUPPLY

Mexico and California will drive the avocado market in the US for several months. Peruvian fruit is primarily distributed at retail, but it contributes to the entire market's stability. Soon, there will be a mix of fruit flowers between Marcena and Flor Loca. Recommend not to determine the fruit maturity based on skin color but to do a manual rotation selection by gently pressuring the avocado to feel how much is giving and pick the ones that are more advanced for use that day. While the late-season fruit harvest at higher elevations produced large sizes and grade 2 fruit, summer crops, which are harvested at lower elevations, often had a size curve dominated by 60s and smaller. Avocados from Colombia are well received, and this fruit has been gaining ground in the US market. Columbian avocado are expecting to arrive the second week of June and go through the summer.

Plants due to be harvested in the next 1-3 months may be affected, but it is yet too early to tell. A late summer/early fall crop is a concern. Some crops have transitioned to the desert, which was crucial for a good supply.

Supplies are available from Salinas, Santa Maria, and Mexico. Supplies are expected to be good for the next few weeks. Great time to promote Cauliflower. (F.O.B pricing for this week \$10.85 - \$12.00)
MARKET ALERT Celery	SUPPLY LIMITED QUALITY FAIR	EXTREME Supplies will continue to be very limited. Quality is reported as only fair, seeder is present and disease pressure. Supplies are currently coming from Oxnard and Santa Maria. Very good demand continues for celery this week. Market pricing will be escalated for next week. Supplies are expected to be limited for the next 2-3 weeks. Waiting for the Salinas crop to start. (F.O.B pricing for this week \$50.00 - \$52.00)
<u>Citrus</u>	SUPPLY GOOD QUALITY GOOD	 Limes: While yields remain elevated, the market has stabilized. Recent rain events have aided fruit growth and color, but they may also result in conditioned flaws such as styler-end breakage and oil spots which can show days after initial shipment. The crop is peaking on small & mid-sized fruit although some operations are seeing a greater distribution of large sizes. European market is booming, which will eventually lead to a shift in Mexican exports. This will help to limit the number of US crossings. Pricing per size has nearly bottomed out and is likely to remain consistent for the next few weeks. Lemons: Weather has been holding up. Shippers will try to stretch current supplies to the end of June. Some very late ranches in D1, but this year will end a little early. Fruit is sizing up. Rain has hurt pack-outs for many growers. Peaking on 115s. 140s Fancy are tight as this is the size/grades preferred by national retailers. Argentina will start in June.
		Oranges: Navels are projecting to end mid-June. Brix is nice with an excellent color. Size is still small and will continue until the end of the Navel season. Peaking on 88s with very limited 48s/56s.

Offshore melon are light as they are wrapping up. Domestic are expecting to start in the next week or two with very light production. Market is volatile. This will affect precut as well. Recommend being flexible with sizing for the next week or two.

Growers are reporting good volumes out of Georgia and California. Red and Yellow Bell peppers are expected to remain on the tighter side for another week or two.

Supplies remain very tight. Baja and California are expected to start production during the front end of June.
Pineapples	<u>SUPPLY</u> FAIR <u>QUALITY</u> GOOD	RADAR The pipeline is yet to be back to normal. Demand exceeds supplies. Supply has not increased, and fruit availability is quite limited. Pineapples are beginning to shift from larger to smaller sizes in the coming weeks.



MARKET ALERT Potatoes	<u>SUPPLY</u> FAIR <u>QUALITY</u> GOOD	Some of the larger sizes are starting to become scarcer, which is driving up the market price. Overall demand exceeds supply slightly. Potatoes will shrink somewhat during storage due to water loss. Remaining supplies are Burbank, which typically have a smaller size profile than Norkotah, therefore, its anticipated that the remaining supplies will have a smaller size profile than those shipped earlier in the season. This indicates that, while there is still availability in the 40s to 60s, as the season progresses, there will be further pressure on the market. Growers were able to get into the field to evaluate the progress of the new crop after a couple of weeks delay due to the abnormal winter. They are reporting good soil temp which means the potatoes are coming up slightly faster than last year. Because of the delayed planting, there may be a gap in August between the old and new crops if we do not make up for lost time with better-than-average growing conditions. Overall, it seems to be a week or two weeks later than usual. This will also affect precut.
Squash	<u>SUPPLY</u> GOOD <u>QUALITY</u> GOOD	Prices for Yellow and Zucchini Squash are trending up this week. Production is coming out of Central Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, and Mexico. Mexico is winding down for the season. California and Baja is starting to come into play.
Strawberries	<u>SUPPLY</u> GOOD <u>QUALITY</u> GOOD	Prices for Strawberries are trending down. Growers are reporting that volumes are down a bit this week as expected post-holiday. Volumes out of Salinas and Watsonville is on the upswing due to good weather.
MARKET ALERT Tomatoes	SUPPLY FAIR QUALITY GOOD	Prices for all Tomatoes are trending down. Supplies remain tight. Production out of Quincy and South Carolina is slowly picking up. Production out of Tennessee and North Carolina is projected to start after the first of July. Volume out of Mexico is down as it transitions to new growing areas. Look for tighter supplies until the Eastern States get fully up and running. Many summertime local deals will start adding volume to the market as we go forward too.
Watermelons	<u>SUPPLY</u> FAIR <u>QUALITY</u> GOOD	Supplies are good on large sizes excepts for small seedless are a bit tight. Georgia will start in a few weeks. Mexican melons are shipping out of Edinburg and Nogales. Mexico volume is expected to ramp up in a couple weeks. Texas production is ramping up. Arizona is expecting to start mid-June.





Produce Category Overview

The produce industry continues to experience unprecedented quality and yield issues due to weather that caused crop failures, poor product quality, and impacted availability. Melons have transition from imports to domestic but are limited in availability due to desert region starting late. Grapes are starting to cross but light and only greens are available with no confirmed start date for reds. Recommend to stay away from offering grapes at this time. Extreme alert for Celery as seeders and other quality issues continues to be challenged in production and expected to be very limited for a few weeks.

Produce on the brain: Stress, mental health and fresh produce

If you're looking for a job where you can rest on your laurels and tune out, fresh produce might not be for you. By contrast, constantly chasing updates on pricing, availability and quality is considered normal in a fresh produce industry that includes seasonal and highly perishable products, as well as dynamic markets and slim profit margins.

While often complex and interesting, the produce industry can also be volatile and nerve-wracking at times. Successful produce leaders often spend much of their day swiftly adapting, communicating and deal making to maintain a business. The other end of the supply chain is no less stressful; agricultural workers tackle a nonstop productivity cycle of growing, harvesting, packing and transporting fresh fruits and vegetables as efficiently as possible.

THE STRESSFUL BUSINESS OF DELIVERING FRESH PRODUCE FROM SEED TO PLATE

In a recent LinkedIn Fresh Produce Industry Discussion Group survey, over 100 produce professionals described their stress level working in fresh produce. The responses underlined that

while the sector is full of professionals who are navigating the stress, the industry still has room to improve.

While a quarter of fresh produce professionals surveyed said that the stress level in a typical week was "unsustainable" and even "toxic," 40% of those surveyed reported that, in their experience, the fresh produce industry was "never dull" and they "mostly enjoyed it." Another guarter of those surveyed reported that a week in fresh produce included an "about average" level of stress. Only 6% reported they are "living the dream.

"The produce industry is full of passionate and highly motivated individuals, and with that comes a certain amount of inherited stress and competition," Madelyn Edlin, marketing and sales manager for Equitable Food Initiative, told The Packer. "Those in this industry are some of the most humble and hardest working people I have ever met.



However, that can result in a high-stress environment that is compounded by prolonged burnout and a sense of never being or doing quite enough,"

But, she added, to include a full picture of mental health in the fresh produce industry, you must start with understanding what farmworkers are experiencing and prioritizing their needs.

"It's imperative to remember the 2.5 million farmworkers who are the backbone of this industry. Without the incredible work they do, there are no cocktail hours, show floors, emails or Zoom calls," Edlin said. "Coming from politically and economically stressed environments, farmworkers are working to provide us with the highest-quality and safest food while fearing the impermanence of working under H-2A or without...
