RADAR Due to cold temperatures in the spring producing later bloom, the new Washington State Apple crop will be 7 to 14 days later than last season. The new crop estimate has not been released to the industry, although it is rumored to be in the 122 million range. While the New crop is on the horizon, the Golden Delicious and Granny Smith are causing a concern. Both are standing with less boxes than anticipated, resulting in an excess of demand over supply. Granny Smith is 2.6 million fewer boxes than this time last year, showing significantly higher market values than usual. Due of the limited supply, it is strongly advised to avoid Granny Smith as much as possible until the new crop is released.

Mexico has very little volume crossing due to the continue effect from El Nino. There could be a potential gap for Mexico mid-August to late-September due to the low supply and high demands. Northern Peru continues to struggle with consistent supplies but expected to improve by October/November. Sizing continues to be a challenge as yields continue to run smaller than normal. Supplies are expected to fluctuate from all growing regions for the next 2-3 months. Overall production is down 40% from Mexico and 60% from Peru. Market is elevated, especially on the larger sizes. Recommend being flexible with sizing at time of loading.

The extreme weather in Peru has put stress on the trees, and the fruit has not grown to size this season; also, the season will end much sooner than anticipated. Historically, 48s and larger account for 81% of Peruvian exports. However, 48s and larger accounted for only 48% of exported volume in June, with 60s dominating, and this trend has continued and worsened throughout July and into August. CA is 3/4 of the way through the 2023 season. Most of southern acreage has been strip-picked in preparation for the impending heat. If CA continues to harvest at high volumes, the season will end early in August. MX is harvesting "Loca." This crop is known for bringing clean fruit (grade 1), thus there are hardly any #2. The size curve is dominated by small fruits. Summer Mexican Hass contains less oil, and the skin may remain green even when fully ripe. Loca fruit takes longer to ripen and should be stored at 42°F. Getting preconditioned orders in ahead of time helps to ensure that ripening specs are met.



QUALITY GOOD Limes: While momentum in the United States has declined and price trends have followed suit, Mexico remains elevated. Extreme heat and humidity are affecting quality and shelf life, contributing to low yields/availability. Overall crossings have declined, and current pack-out yields account for a 20-25% loss on the line, which has improved from prior weeks. Most operations are transitioning to the new production cycle. Peak sizing consists of 230s & 250s with limited availability in larger fruit. As the summer progresses, the weather will continue to play a role in overall quality. It is advised to be aware of changes in advertised grade specifications.

Lemons: Due to this year's heavy rains in California, many lemons were lost. As a result, 140s and smaller are very tight, which has driven up prices to levels that are unusual for this time of year. The 165s and 200s have become quite tight in the last month and are very challenging to cover. Picking has begun in D2 coastal area. There is more choice fruit than normal due to the heavy scarring. Due to the damage, lemons have been difficult to manage.

Oranges: This season's Valencia, which run heavy to 138/113/88s, are ideal for food service. Fruit is tasty, firm, and color great. Brix is at 13-14. In most years, when schools reopen in August because the fruit has grown out of the smaller sizes, the industry faces a demand-supply imbalance. With the amount of small fruit this year, not expecting any big issue. Valencia is not in high demand in July, which will help the overall supply. Valencia is expected to go through October until Navels starts without any gaps.

Advise being flexible with sizing (open your size spec) for the majority, if not the entire summer, to ensure all fruit supply.

Plunging freight rates could head upward

Produce shippers have been enjoying a substantial drop in transportation costs this year after enduring some of the highest freight rates ever during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Those rock-bottom prices could be short-lived, however.

Freight costs in January 2022 for a load of refrigerated produce out of California to the East Coast averaged \$5.19 per mile, according to the USDA. In late July this year, the rate was \$3.55.

Just one year ago, a 2,781-mile trip from Fresno, Calif., to Baltimore cost \$14,433. By late July this year, the cost had plummeted to \$9,872.

The industry's transportation woes started in 2020 when the pandemic shut down driver training schools, resulting in a shortage of truck drivers, said Dean Croke, principal industry analyst at DAT Freight & Analytics, with headquarters in Beaverton, Ore., and Denver.

But when Paycheck Protection Program loans ended July 2020, there was a rush to join the trucking industry from people who had never been in the industry or who had been driving for a larger fleet and bought their own trucks because rates were so high.

At the same time, during the second half of 2020, diesel prices dropped to \$2.40 a gallon, and spot rates for freight increased about \$1 per mile — from \$1.30 to \$2.30, Croke said.

"The diversion of those two data points away from each other was really what started the whole ball rolling," he said.

After PPP loans ended, about 100,000 carriers joined the ranks of the trucking industry over a 12-month period.

Carriers already were making good money because of all the disruptions caused by the pandemic, and they were making even more money because of the low cost of diesel fuel, Croke said.

"When the pandemic hit, it kind of put the transport people on the map," said Michael Fernandes, director of sales for John Greene Logistics, Titusville, Fla.

Companies that routinely sought out cheaper trucks "learned the lesson that cheaper is not always the best way to go," he said.

Suppliers that had built relationships with carriers and treated them as equal partners came through the pandemic in much better shape transportationwise than those who consistently...
