Asparagus demand is still exceeding supply due to El Nino weather conditions, which have been made worse by recent hurricanes and storms in the growing regions. Sizing continues to be a challenge as yields continued to run smaller than normal. Shortages are expected to last through January. Supplies for Large, XL, and Jumbo continue to be extremely short. The market continues to be elevated, especially on larger, XL and jumbo sizes. Recommend being flexible with sizing at time of loading.

Mexico continues to harvest healthy volumes of Flora Loca, with a size curve skewing small. The USDA has not reported Mexican 32/36s for the past three weeks due to a lack of supplies. Aside from the 32/36s, there has been more of a balance of supply and demand, which has helped to reduce the cost of harvesting in the fields. When the Aventajada harvest ramps up and moves up in elevation, more sizes should be available. The color of the avocado's skin does not indicate ripeness. Avocados that are ripe and ready to eat may seem green in color, and the skin may be tough to the touch and not offer the same "give" when pressure is applied. When compared to mid and late season avocados, the fruit has less oil and takes longer to ripen.

QUALITY GOOD Limes: The market is elevated, and costs have increased. Northern Mexico has received heavy rain in recent weeks because of the various hurricanes and tropical storms that have impacted the surrounding area. The combination of supply shortages and increased Labor Day demand has created a supply chain imbalance. Extreme heat and humidity have impacted quality and shelf life, contributing to low availability. Quality has reached a seasonal low of 35% pack-out loss of total harvested yields. Within the following two or three weeks, expect to see an overall improvement in pricing, quality, and availability. Peak sizing is currently dominated by small fruit, including 230's and 250's; large and mid-sized fruit will become more available as the current production cycle progresses.

Lemons: ALERT Lemons have been tight all summer from all regions. D3 shippers had hoped to begin harvesting within the next week, but heavy rains have delayed harvesting until the end of September. Chile, Argentina, and Mexico have been covering but are struggling to maintain a constant weekly supply. Overall supply is expected to be better going into October once D3 starts. If loading oranges out of Florida is feasible, import lemons can be shipped to Florida, allowing trucks to load both. This will require some planning, so keep in touch with your supplier.

Oranges: ALERT Valencia 88's and smaller are very tight. Demand exceeds supply daily. Most years, the shift from Valencia to Navels has gone smoothly, but this year will be different. Valencia is expected to be done in the first week of October and Navels are delay until the first or second week of November due to weather. 72's and bigger CA Valencia or Florida Oranges are expected to start mid-October.

Produce Category Overview

Asparagus are extremely limited on Large, Jumbo, and XL. Blackberries and Blueberries have limited supplies. Brussels Sprouts are slightly better but remain escalated. Chili Peppers remain tight due to the weather. Grapes have been impacted and reduced by 30% due to the recent Hurricane in the west, causing a possible gap before offshore is available at the end of the year. Domestic Lemons are delayed until end of September due to all the rain they have received.

Valencia 88s and smaller are tight with this variety expected to end the first week of October. Navels are delayed until the first or second week of November. Good time to promote Broccolini, Carrots, Celery, Iceberg, Green and Red Leaf Lettuce, Kale, and Romaine.


Agronometrics Shorts: Extortion of lime farmers in Michoacán causes prices to soar September 7, 2023 | freshfruitportal.com

The average daily prices of Limes in the US leaped by 15.08% in week 34, marking a \$4.50 increase on the prices recorded on August 24, from \$29.83 to \$34.33. Things have turned sour in one of Mexico's top lime producing regions, where many

growers and packers have stopped working, rather than pay extortion money to cartels — causing the price of limes to spike.

A survey by the newspaper Milenio, has illuminated significant shifts in the pricing of limes within the markets of Morelia, the capital of Michoacán. The cost of one kilogram of limes has escalated from the range of 20 to 25 pesos (equivalent to US \$1.19 to \$1.49) to the range of 40 to 45 pesos (\$2.38 to \$2.68) within the previous week.

This price elevation concurs with the unfolding tenday cessation of labor activities within Michoacán's Tierra Caliente region, an area encompassing a pivotal hub of lime production centered around the municipality of Apatzingán and characterized by its susceptibility to cartel-related activities.



It is worth highlighting that approximately 80% of Mexico's total lime output originates from the Tierra Caliente farms. Lime growers have forewarned of the potential for further price hikes if the prevailing regional conflict remains unresolved.

Accounts from certain lime growers suggest that criminal entities are demanding a fee of one peso per kilogram of limes sold, equating to a cumulative levy of 1,000 pesos (equivalent to US \$59.51) per metric ton. Others say they are demanding 2,000 pesos per tonne — 1,000 pesos from the grower and 1,000 pesos from the packer.
