RADAR (Gala) Washington is assessing Gala crop inventory due to tight Q2 market conditions, suggesting moving Galas to Fujis until September due to limited availability.

asparagus




Mexican and Peruvian production has improved due to market normalization, while Washington, Michigan, and Canadian production remain available. White asparagus remains scarce from Peru until mid-July.

avocados




The demand for fruit in the field has surged due to reduced US inventories and the need to refill the pipeline. Field pricing is being increased, and market adjustments will continue to rise. Mexico is the predominant source for 48s and larger fruit, with all four COOs favoring smaller fruit. The rainy season in Mexico has not started yet, and if drought conditions persist, erratic crop cycles could continue into 2024-25. Peruvian arrivals will become significant in the next two weeks, potentially restoring market stability.

Snow Peas: Guatemalan and Mexican supply are facing challenges due to heat, lack of rain, and

growing region transitions, leading to increased volumes and market escalation.


Blackberries: Prices are up with good quality. Mexico fruit is showing a nice sheen and color, occasional regression, and overripe fruit. Volumes are steady, though light, in Watsonville as the season begins.

Blueberries: Prices remain stable, with good quality. However, soft fruit in the Central Valley and flower debris and shriveled fruit in Mexico may occur due to hot weather, but the volume continues to be strong. Production is expected to decrease in Florida and Georgia, with Mexico following in the coming weeks.

Raspberries: Prices are lower and quality remains good, with occasional light-colored fruit from Mexico. Volumes are increasing, though light, in Watsonville as the season begins.

Strawberries: Prices are decreasing, Santa Maria yields good quality with bruising, peak production, and strong volumes, while Watsonville/Salinas reports good quality with bruising and overripe fruit.

broccoli



Broccolini: Supply is on budget and demand is good, with better quality as production transitions back to Salinas. Harvesting is steady, and contract pricing will not escalate.





brussels sprouts

The supply has improved, with good quality and demand. Market pricing has also improved, and it is expected to remain steady in the coming weeks. It's a great time to promote.

cabbages

Supplies are steady and of good quality. Availability from Oxnard and Salinas, and the markets and supplies, are expected to remain stable in the coming weeks.

carrots

New crops are on the horizon, with improved supply and quality going forward.

cauliflower

The supply is light and demand is good, with supplies coming from Salinas and Santa Maria. Mexico has limited supplies, and the quality is fair. Expect limited supplies in the next few weeks. Market pricing is active.

celery

Supply is improving, with current supplies coming from Santa Maria and Oxnard, and production has started in the Salinas region. Quality is reported as improving, and steady supplies are expected in the next few weeks.

citrus

Limes: RADAR Cinco de Mayo is impacting the limes, with rain and sun patterns favoring small sizes. If this trend continues, 110s and 150s will be tight, potentially pushing the overall size spectrum and necessitating an opening size spec.

Lemons: ALERT The industry relies heavily on CA D2 from the Ventura/Riverside area, but is facing high unusable fruit going to juice due to heavy on larger size and quality pressure on the 140-200s market. Demand exceeds supply, and imports from Argentina and Chile are on the horizon. Argentina's heavy size and large shipments may not help alleviate the small market. Chilean imports are expected to arrive in mid-July and run larger, while Mexico is the only alternative. Mexico is running smaller, requiring it to be open and flexible with sizes.

Oranges: The transition from CA Navels and FL Valencia to CA Valencia has been completed, with sizing peaking at 72/88's and 113's. The industry may continue with Valencia through the summer, but foodservice sizing will become scarce in August, September, and October. Communication with receivers and sizing up will be crucial. An alternative is to take import Navels and load in New Jersey.

corn

Pricing is steady. Supplies are plentiful and of good quality in Georgia. It's a good time to promote.

cucumbers

Pricing is steady. Georgia has good supplies, but recent rains have affected quality. Hot temperatures in Mexican growing regions are causing some quality issues. Baja offers the best quality, but volumes are low.


grapes

RADAR Mexican volumes are expected to increase weekly, with the volume of Flames into Nogales having been strong, while Greens volumes are expected to gradually increase over the next ten days.

Cilantro: ALERT Supply is limited, with less than fair quality. Market pricing has increased, and supplies are shipping out of Oxnard and Salinas. Expected supply shortages and increased markets in the coming weeks.

Kale

Supply is steady with good demand and quality. Supplies and market prices are expected to be steady for the next few weeks.

lettuce

Green & Red Leaf: The supply is good, with improved quality and weights. Market pricing has also improved, and contracts are expected to return to normal pricing in the next few weeks.


Iceberg: EXTREME The supply is expected to be light and fair, with lighter weights and smaller heads. Markets are expected to remain increased, and contract pricing will escalate next week. The next few weeks are expected to be active in the markets.

Romaine: ALERT Supply is improving with fair quality and good demand in Salinas and Santa Maria, with expected continued improvement in markets in the coming weeks.

Tender Leaf: The supply is expected to remain steady, with good to fair quality and good demand. Most have transitioned to Salinas, and improvements are expected in the next few weeks.

Cantaloupe: RADAR Lighter supplies are



Honeydew: RADAR Limited volume and minimal sizing profile. Expect improvements in sizing/ yields as new fields break. The quality is mostly clean, with some external scarring.

Watermelons: Production is increasing in Florida and Mexico with good demand.


mushrooms

The weather has improved the quality and supply of brown and white, indicating a steady supply for the next few months. It's a good time to promote.

onions

ALERT (Red) The quality is good in all growing regions, with steady demand. Market prices are down slightly, with red remaining elevated. New Mexico has started giving some relief. The reds will be tight through the summer.

onions green



Supplies are steady, primarily from Mexico, and demand has increased. Warmer weather is expected to improve supplies, and market pricing and quality are expected to improve in the coming weeks.

pears

Bartletts and Bosc are done for the season, with some available but at a very high market price. Avoid them and switch to D'Anjous if possible, which will be available until next season starts.






Supplies are limited, and size curve availability fluctuates weekly, requiring flexibility in sizes.

The market is flat, with good quality. Idaho is

shipping Burbank with a sizing profile smaller than Norkotahs, which is causing the 40–60ct price to increase and be a bit short. Idaho has plenty of availability, making it a good time to promote potatoes.

The market remains firm. Florida is winding down in the east with a fair volume. Georgia has started, which will help with supply. East Mexico and Baja are seeing increased volumes with good quality.

Gala apples are expected to be tight until September. Green beans are limited due to the weather in Georgia. Raspberries prices are down with fair quality. Iceberg are on extreme alert with light availability. Lemons are peaking on large fruit, with small fruit being limited. Chili peppers are on remain high with poblano and serrano being limited. Zucchini and yellow squash are extremely limited due to the weather in Georgia. It's a good time to promote Brussels Sprouts, Corn, Mushrooms and Potatoes.

Consumers prioritize sustainability in produce purchase decisions

Sustainability remains an important concern for consumers into 2024, according to The Packer's Sustainability Insights 2024 survey, which found that more than three-quarters of consumers surveyed place at least some priority on sustainability in their buying decisions, up 4% from 2023. Thirty percent of consumers surveyed place primary priority on it.

Fielded April 2-11, 2024, the webbased quantitative survey of 491 consumers from across the country found that younger consumers in particular prioritize sustainability and associate terms such as "eco," "climate," "energy" and "friendly" with the movement.

All respondents were age 18 or older, live in the U.S. and do most or all of their household grocery shopping.

The younger the respondent, the higher a priority sustainability is when


making a purchase. Sustainability Insights 2024 found that 78% of 18-24-year-olds ranked sustainability as a primary or secondary priority versus 51% of those aged 65 or older. Meanwhile, 27% of those 65 and older said that sustainability was not a priority compared with just 4% of 18-24-year-olds.

Consumers polled also represented a range of income levels, with 22% of respondents reporting household incomes of \$25,000 to \$49,999, followed by 21% reporting household incomes of \$100,000 to \$149,000.

Forty-two percent of survey respondents indicated they're married, with 46% reporting two adults living in
