

Oxnard, CA: Mostly sunny with some cloudy skies with highs in the 60s and 70s and lows in the 50s.

Salinas, CA: Partly cloudy skies with some sun and highs in the 60s and lows in the 40s.

apples



Washington's 2025 crop is projected to reach 142 million 40 lb boxes, matching the 2014 record thanks to ideal growing conditions—mild temperatures, steady sunlight, and low pest pressure. Harvest began in early August and runs through November, with fruit sizing expected to be larger than last year, though more variable due to hand thinning and natural factors.

asparagus



Supply from Mexico and Peru remains steady with overall good quality. Demand is moderate, and pricing is expected to stay firm. Mexican weather is being monitored closely, as cooler conditions could slightly tighten the market.

avocados



Supply from Mexico and Peru remains steady with overall good quality. Demand is moderate, and pricing is expected to stay firm. Mexican weather is being monitored closely, as cooler conditions could slightly tighten the market.

bananas



Supply remains steady with strong quality across major growing regions. Pricing is expected to stay stable, with no major disruptions anticipated. Tariff relief continues to exert slight downward pressure on delivered costs.

beans



Green Beans: Supplies has improved and market price are steady.

Snow Peas: ALERT Guatemalan supply remains limited due to weather and is expected to stay tight for two weeks, while Peru are done.

berries



Blackberries: Supplies are steady, with fair quality. Quality concerns in Mexico are improving as humidity-related challenges ease. While there have been minor delays with product from Mexico, good supplies and stable market pricing are expected over the coming weeks.

Blueberries: There were some delays due to late container arrivals and a truck labor stoppage in Mexico. Despite this, production has ramped up quickly, with an estimated 30% increase in volume crossing from Mexico. This trend is expected to continue through December, supporting strong supply levels.

Raspberries: ALERT Supplies are limited from Southern California as some regions are ending and others face weather-related delays. Challenges are expected to persist through December. Production in Southern Mexico is ongoing, with overall quality reported as fair. Increased crossings from Mexico should help improve availability over the next several weeks.

Strawberries: EXTREME Supplies are improving across key regions. In Santa Maria, mild weather and no rain are forecast, supporting good fruit quality and slightly higher counts, though volumes remain low and will increase gradually. The spring crop shows strong potential for late December. Florida reports excellent quality and steady volume growth, with production expected to surge around Christmas. Mexico continues to deliver strong quality and increasing output, helping offset earlier storm-related losses in California. Overall, supply is tight now but expected to strengthen through December as Florida and Mexico ramp up.





broccoli



Broccolini: Supplies and overall quality have improved as growers transition to the Yuma region. Limited availability has kept pricing elevated, and markets are expected to remain firm. Continued improvements in supply and pricing are anticipated in the coming weeks.

brussels sprouts

EXTREME Supplies are extremely limited, with fair quality. Availability is expected to remain tight for the next week or two as Mexico lags in production and labor strikes further constrain supply. Gradual improvement is anticipated, though volumes will likely stay below normal until the growing region fully transitions

cabbages

Supplies have improved with better yields and quality in Yuma. Demand has eased following the holiday period, and continued improvement in supply is anticipated in the coming weeks.

carrots

The carrot market is in great shape with strong availability across all sizes. Quality remain excellent, and pricing is expected to remain stable into next week.

cauliflower

Supplies are very strong as demand has eased. Product is shipping from Yuma, with availability expected to continue improving in the coming weeks. Quality is good, supported by favorable weather with no rain in the forecast. Market pricing is improving, and steady conditions are anticipated in the weeks ahead.

celery

Supplies remain very light as holiday demand adds pressure to the market. Additional acreage coming online in Yuma should provide some relief in the weeks ahead. Market pricing is expected to stay elevated until supplies improve.

citrus

Limes: Mexican supply is steady, though cooler weather may slightly slow harvest. Colombian fruit continues to supplement the market. Overall quality is good, with only minor skin scarring noted. Demand is firm, and pricing is expected to stay stable.

Lemons: California's crop is at peak condition, offering excellent quality and strong sizing. Supply is robust, and demand remains steady.

Oranges: Navel season is in full swing, showcasing outstanding internal quality and vibrant color. Supply is strong, and demand is trending upward with holiday programs.

cucumbers

Florida's winter field production is minimal, shifting Eastern demand to Mexico and Honduras. Honduras will begin mid-December with lighter volumes as some growers skipped planting. Mexico has moderate supplies, with Baja winding down while Sonora and Sinaloa

ramp up, offering the best quality and color. Central Mexico remains light. In the near term, availability should stay steady to moderate, improving as Northern and Western Mexico expand production and Honduras adds seasonal product.

grapes

Imports are arriving with excellent early-season quality. Peru's harvest is in full swing, boosting volume on both East and West Coasts. Pricing should remain steady with improved supply, and color, firmness, and sizing continue to show strong performance.

herbs

Basil and chervil remain stable in both supply and quality. Cooler California temperatures may slow growth slightly, but no meaningful market impact is anticipated.


Cilantro: ALERT Supplies are light, though quality remains good. Product is shipping from Oxnard, and Mexico. Market pricing has risen with growing transitions and strong demand, and supplies are expected to stay limited with elevated pricing in the coming weeks

Supplies are steady with fair quality, and demand remains strong. Product is shipping from Salinas and Oxnard, with market pricing stable. Conditions are expected to remain consistent over the next several weeks.

Green & Red Leaf: ALERT Supplies have improved



insecticides previously used are no longer approved or effective, and resistance has developed. Colder weather will help reduce gnat populations, but this issue is expected to persist for several weeks. Supply challenges are likely to continue through December.

onions



RADAR Supplies remain strong with consistent quality across the board. Overall market prices are slightly below last year, though reds and whites have shown modest increases. Medium reds and whites are expected to rise further as volumes remain limited. Whites are facing quality challenges and are likely to be tight heading into January, while medium reds are constrained by the predominance of jumbo sizes.

onions green



EXTREME Supplies are limited in the coming weeks as growers report lower yields. This trend is expected to persist, keeping prices elevated amid strong demand. Quality remains fair.

pears



Washington's 2025 crop is rebounding after a challenging 2024 season, with growers reporting excellent bloom, minimal frost damage, and strong, uniform sizing. Early estimates suggest the crop could exceed 400,000 tons, returning to pre-2022 levels, thanks to favorable spring weather and improved orchard management.



With Canada's season done, production has shifted to Mexico and winter import programs.

Central Mexico is the main source with light to moderate supply and generally good quality, though some light greening is noted during transition. Western Mexico will begin harvesting in 2–3 weeks and quickly become the primary region, improving availability and supply.



pineapples

Markets are tightening as growers raise concerns about Q1 2026 supply. Demand remains elevated, and available volumes may fluctuate by region. Import arrivals are consistent, though sizing will vary. Expect firmer markets and potential upward pricing pressure.

squash



Florida yellow squash supplies have tightened after an early start, with harvest centered in Plant City and more fields expected in 2–3 weeks. Quality is good. In Mexico, Sonora has light yellow squash but stronger zucchini, while Sinaloa is just beginning and will become the main source. Yellow squash supplies remain tight, with gradual improvement anticipated as Florida expands and Sinaloa increases production.

tomatoes



Florida supplies are improving as growers move south. Roma volumes are rebounding, and Naples will start mid-December. Picks show strong size and quality. Round production is steady with large sizes early, easing slightly later, and grape volumes remain strong with very good quality. In the West, current supply from Baja, Central Mexico, and Sonora is tapering as Culiacán ramps up mid-December to become the main region. Quality is generally good, and overall availability

commodities alert overview

Green beans are tight after Georgia's early finish; Florida is starting light harvests, and Sinaloa will boost supply later this month. Snow peas remain scarce from Guatemala, and Peru has ended production. Blueberries are improving, but raspberries and strawberries face shortages from weather impacts in California and Mexico. Broccoli and broccolini supplies are recovering in Yuma, while Brussels sprouts, green onions, celery, and mushrooms remain very limited. Lettuce and cilantro are improving slowly, though pricing stays high. Chili peppers and squash are tight but should strengthen as Sinaloa ramps up.

US Produce industry speaks up: The potential impact of the upcoming USMCA agreement review

The 2026 joint review of the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) will take place next July, and the produce industry is working to maintain its influence in the decision -making process.

The three countries, which represent 30 percent of global GDP, will determine the future of their trade agreement, which is set to expire in 2036. The decision has the power to reshape North American trade and US agriculture.

USMCA's Impact on North American produce trade

Since the removal of the final transitional agricultural trade restrictions under the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) in 2007, US agricultural trade with Mexico and Canada has strengthened.

Today, both US neighbors are the top two export markets for American fruits and vegetables. In 2024, fresh produce trade among the three countries totaled \$35 billion.

Since USMCA replaced NAFTA in 2020, total North American trade has reached \$1.88 trillion, with double-digit year-on-year growth.

From 2021 to 2023, US imports from Mexico increased by over 100 percent, rising from \$8.2 billion to

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\$19.6 billion.

Fresh Voices: Produce industry chimes in

To ensure the agricultural industry's interests are considered in the upcoming USMCA review, leading grower organizations have submitted comments to the agreement's public docket and issued statements.

In a letter to US Trade Representative Jamieson Greer, government officials and major organizations, including the California Citrus Mutual (CCM) and the Organic Produce Association (OPA), expressed support for the agreement.

The letter states that, thanks to the treaty's "seamless integration provided under the agriculture provisions," US agricultural exports to Mexico and Canada increased by \$10.7 billion and \$7.6 billion, respectively.

The letter also notes that USMCA's integration of agricultural provisions streamlines compliance, harmonizes regulations, facilitates cross-border trade, and reduces costs for American farmers, producers, and ranchers.

The International Fresh Produce Association (IFPA) also supports the agreement and hopes any revisions will further strengthen the movement of specialty crops across North America.



In a press release, the organization said that since its implementation, "the USMCA has provided critical market access and stability for the fresh produce sector—supporting a highly integrated North American supply chain that enables year-round delivery of nutritious, high-quality, and affordable fruits and vegetables to US consumers."

Not Everyone's on Board

The California Avocado Commission, on the other hand, believes the USMCA should be modified to reinstate prior inspection protocols and establish a tariff-rate quota on avocado imports from Mexico.

According to CAC's comments, "over the past two decades, the steep...
